Dark shades refer to pupils with SEN

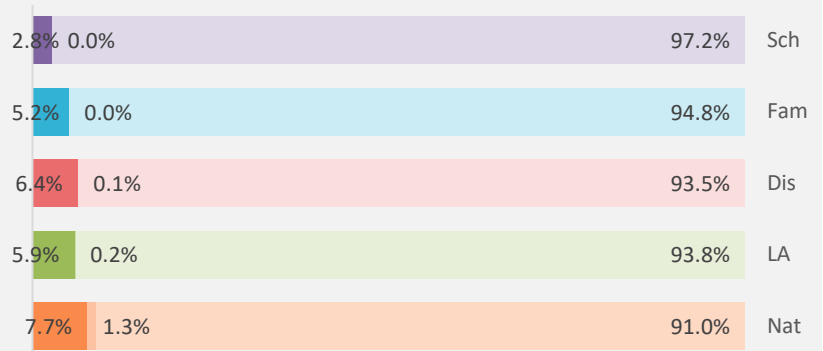


21.6% (8) of your pupils in years R-11 with SEN provision are also eligible for FSM compared with 18.1% (45) of non-SEN pupils.

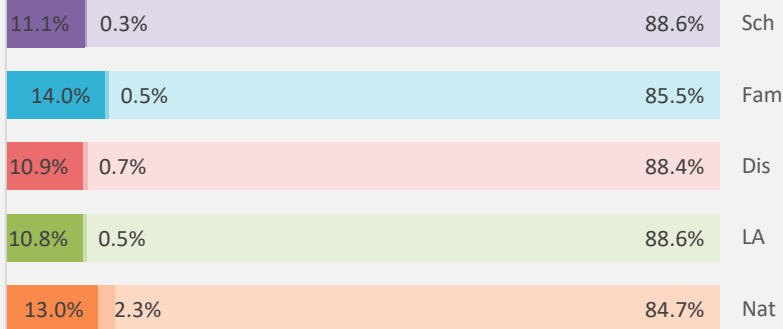
Early years pupils (years E1-R) with SEN

All year groups with SEN



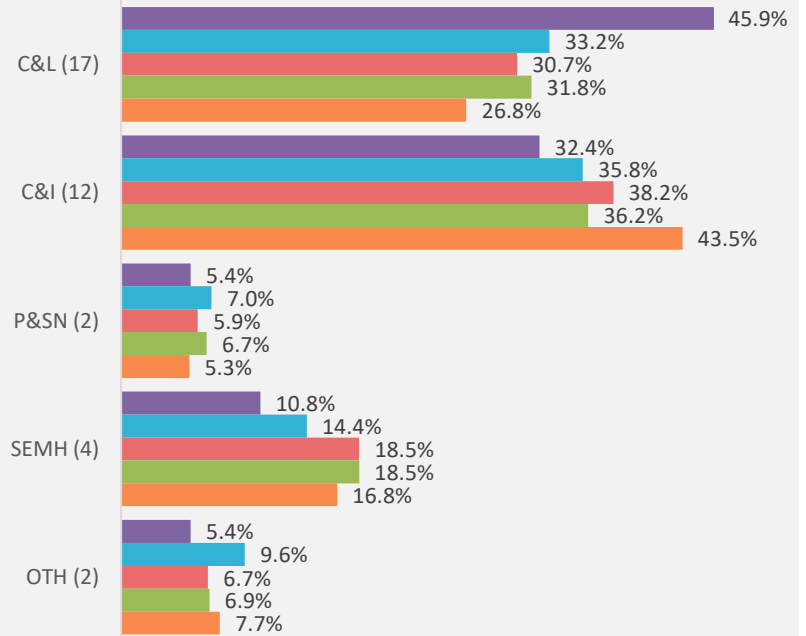
37 of your 325 pupils are classified as having SEN, this is 11.4% of your cohort.

SEN areas of need

The most common area of need among pupils in this school is cognition and learning. There are 17 pupils recorded as having this as their area of need which equates to 45.9% of all SEN pupils.

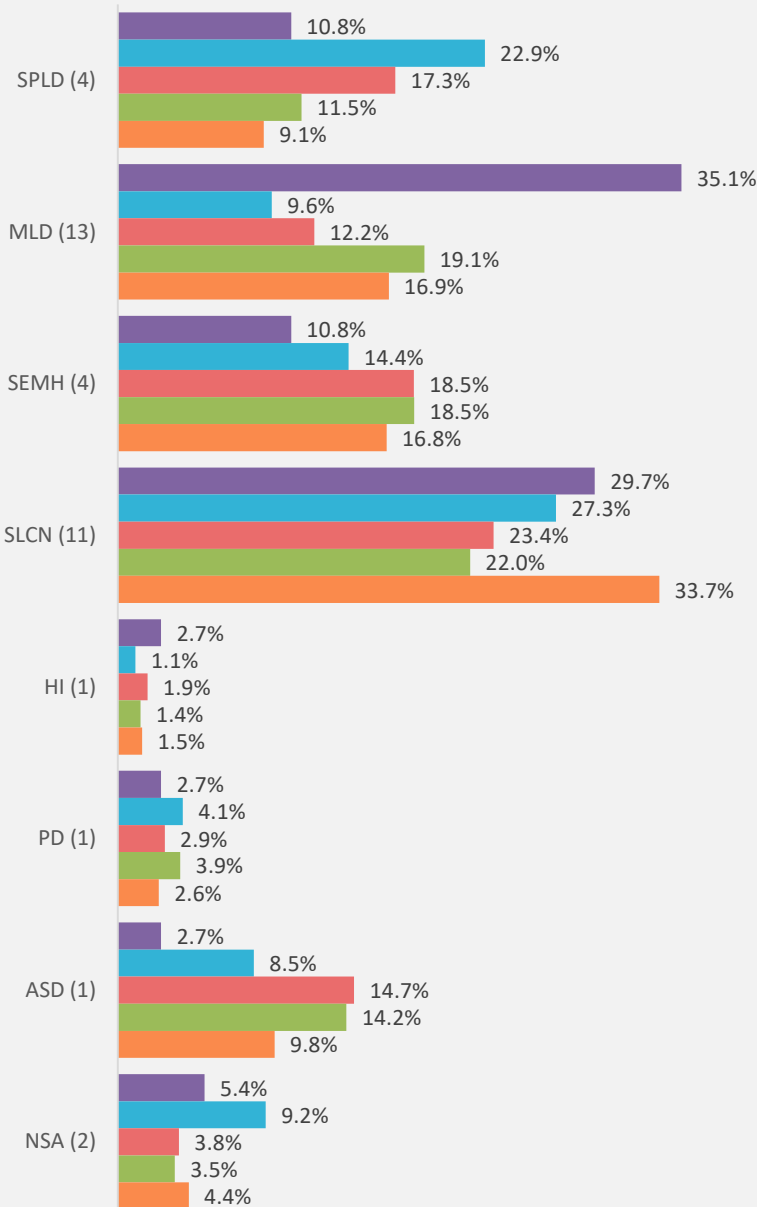
The second most common area of need is communication and interaction with 12 pupils or 32.4% of all SEN pupils.



SEN primary type of need

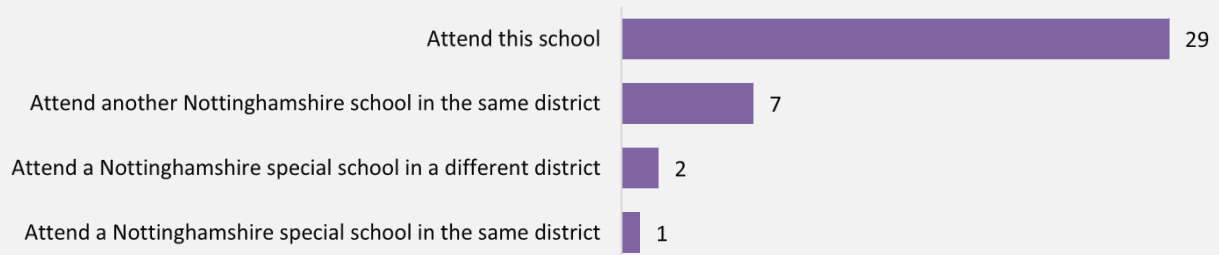
The most common type of need among pupils in this school is moderate learning difficulty. There are 13 pupils recorded as having this as their primary type of need which equates to 35.1% of all SEN pupils.

Pupils with SEN where this is their closest school (based on pupils in years R-11)

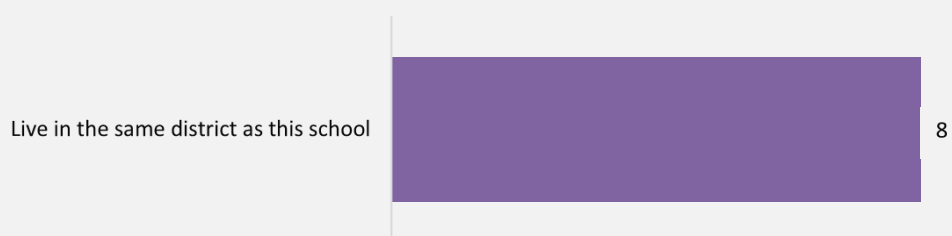
Distance is as the crow flies

Pupils with SEN who attend this school where another school is closer (based on pupils in years R-11)

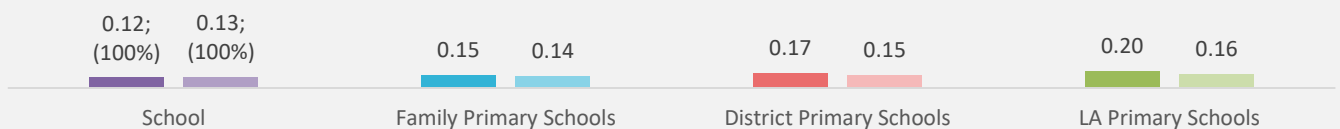

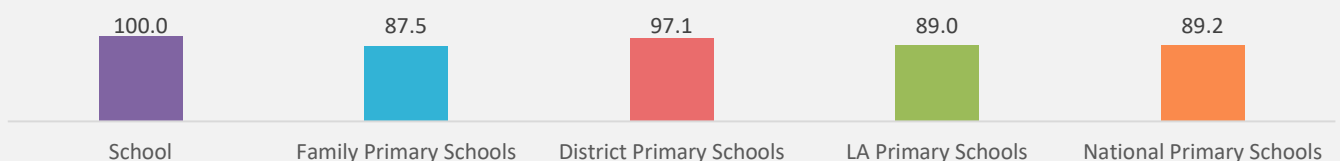
Income Deprivation Affecting Children Index (IDACI)

Income Deprivation Affecting Children Index (IDACI)	School census (Jan 2022); English indices of deprivation (2019)	<p>IDACI measures the proportion of children aged 0-15 living in income deprived families. Each geographical area nationally (Lower Super Output Area or LSOA for short) is given a score of 0-1 which is effectively a percentage (0%-100%). The score shows the percentage of children in each LSOA that live in families that are income deprived (i.e. in receipt of certain benefits). An IDACI score of, for example, 0.24 means that 24% of children aged less than 16 in that area are living in families that are income deprived.</p> <p>A school average is calculated by matching the pupil postcode to the LSOA area in which they live. This provides a score (0-1) for each pupil. The score of each pupil is then averaged. The coverage in the dataset shows the proportion of pupils who were able to be matched to an LSOA / score. This is shown on the chart for the school only as a percentage in brackets.</p> <p>IDACI is geographical measure based on families who live in that area – it is not family specific like free school meals.</p>
